All the manuscripts described below were presented by William Henry Denham Rouse (1863–1950), the great headmaster of the Perse School, Cambridge, who was a Fellow of the College from 1888 to 1894 and Honorary Fellow from 1933 until his death. Dr Rouse collected nearly all these books on his travels in the Aegean in the 1890's, as is made clear by his brief notes on the flyleaves; so far as I know he left no other record of his purchases.

MS. 248. Synesius, Letters, in Modern Greek (in the order 1–8, 10, 9, 12–35, 37–44, 36 [in the middle of 44], 45, 46, 48, 47, 49, 50, 54, 51–3, 55–62, 11, 63–156). A second, less formal hand has supplied the text on fos. 75^r–82^r and 148^v–178^v.

18th cent., finished 3 July 1766 (fo. 178°, in the second hand). On fo. i' a note dated 10 December 1787.

Euchologion: (fo. 1") the Order for the Burial of Priests, incomplete (differing in many places from the printed version), (fo. 24th) fragment of an office, (fo. 26") the Morning Office, incomplete, (fo. 32") Liturgy of St Basil, beginning wanting, (fo. 55") Liturgy of the Presanctified, incomplete, (fo. 64") the Order of Baptism, with the preliminaries and 'Απόλυσις, beginning and end wanting, (fo. 72r) part of a prayer for the forgiveness of sins, a longer version of Goar, pp. 536-7, (fos. 73v-83v, 85r-88v, 89r-92v) Office of the Holy Oil, not quite complete. Fragments of a New Testament Lectionary: (fo. 931) 'Αποστολοευάγγελα τῆς ὅλης ἑβδομάδος, beginning with the lessons for Tuesday (cf. Goar, pp. 723-4), (fo. 99°) Gospels and Epistles for the period of St John, Sundays only, except for mid-Pentecost and Ascension Day, (fo. 1181) ἀκολουθία τῆς γονυκλισίας τῆς Πεντηκοστῆς, (fo. 126°) Epistle for Whitmonday, incomplete, (fo. 127°) Gospel for the Sunday of All Saints, followed immediately by lessons for the Sunday of the Prodigal Son and all Sundays till the 4th in Lent, also for the Saturday before Meat Fast Sunday and the 1st Saturday in Lent. Fo. 84 has been misplaced: it contains the Gospels for the 5th Sunday in Lent and for Palm Sunday, Morning Office.

MS. 253. New Testament Lectionary, Aland 1 1985, beginning in the Gospel for the 2nd Saturday in the period of St John. Saturday and Sunday lessons only,

except for mid-Pentecost, Ascension Day, the first week in Lent and Holy Week. No Saturday lessons for the 3rd week of St John or the pre-Fast weeks of the Triodion period; (fo. 236^r) 'Αποστολοευάγγελα τῆς ὅλης ἑβδομάδος (cf. Goar, pp. 723–4), not quite complete; (fo. 239^r) the first ten Resurrection Gospels, the 10th incomplete; (fo. 244^r) notes and tables. On fo. 168^{r, v} after the lessons for 30 September: Chrysostom*, Sermo Catecheticus in Pascha (P.G. LIX, 721–4).

Late 16th cent., several hands. Elaborately but crudely decorated head-pieces and initials. Many marginal scribblings, including the dates 1647 (fo. 82^r) and 1735 (fo. 89^r) and variations on the name διακός του παπά γεωργι...

Miscellany of Ascetic works: (fo. 1^r) διήγησις ἐν τῷ γεροντικῷ πάνυ ώφέλιμος, a fuller version of BHG 1445 c; (fo. 3°) sermon (?) on remembering God, beg. εἶπε τὶς τῶν ἀγίων ὅτι ὀφείλει ὁ μοναχός, incomplete; (fos. 5^r-10^v, 12^{r, v}, 11^r) another sermon (?), beginning wanting, on the hereafter; (fo. 11^r) περὶ τῆς εἰς θεὸν ἀγάπης, quoting Maximus (Capita de Caritate) and Isidore, in two sections, the second beginning on fo. 21°, incomplete; (fo. 23°) miscellany on eating and drinking, beginning wanting: the first complete item begins ἀδελφὸς ἠρώτησε γέροντα λέγων ἰδού παραβάλλω, followed by passages ascribed to Esacus, Cassian, the Gerontikon and Ephraem; (fo. 31^r) allegorical story about a snake deceiving a man with treasure, beginning wanting (perhaps = διήγησις περὶ τοῦ ἀνθρώπου καὶ τοῦ ὄφεως, as in several manuscripts on Mt Athos with contents similar to these, e.g. St Anne 20); (fo. 44") two stories about kindness to animals, the first ascribed to Antiochus ὁ πάντεκτος beg. ἐγένετό τις ἀββᾶς ονόματι βαδιανὸς, the second beg . ἄλλος δέ τις εἴχε κύνα; (fo. 45°) another story, in Modern Greek, beg. είς τὴν ἔδεσαν; (fo. 46^r) part of a dialogue between Basil and Gregory Nazianzen (beg. τί ἐστιν ἀρχή;), misbound: the correct order of the fos. is 135°, 46, 48, 47; (fo. 47°) two short extracts ἐκ τῆς δευτέρας ἐπιστολῆς τοῦ ἀγίου μάρκου [Marcus Eremita?], περὶ ἐκείνων ὁποῦ ἀκούουν τὸν λόγον τοῦ θεοῦ, and a story in Modern Greek about Philemon, incomplete; (fo. 49^τ) Life of St Alexios, in Modern Greek, beginning wanting; (fo. 68^r) ἱστορία διονυσίου...τοῦ ἡήτορος ἀσκοῦντος ἐν τῆ σκητῆ τῆς λαύρας, a collection of anecdotes in Modern Greek; (fo. 721) Ephraem Syrus, In Patres Defunctos (Assemani, I, pp. 172-5); (fo. 78°) Daniel Rhaithenus, Prologue to the work of Climacus, BHG 882a, not quite complete (together with two verses from BHG 882b); (fo. 79^r) more anecdotes in Modern Greek, perhaps part of the collection of Dionysios; (fo. 80^r) Dionysios the Studite, translations into Modern Greek of Isaac Syrus, λόγος πρός μοναχούς άρχαρίους and of Basil, λόγος άσκητικός πῶς δεῖ κοσμεῖσθαι τὸν μοναχόν; (fo. 89^{v}) Basil, ἐκ τῶν ἀσκητικῶν περὶ πῶς όφείλει διάγειν εν κοινωβίω καὶ ὅπως λέγονται κοινοβιάται, in Modern Greek; (fo. 91°) story in Modern Greek about the scribe Marcellus; (fo. 92°) Ephraem Syrus, In Vanam Vitam (Assemani, III, pp. 308-14), ascribed to Chrysostom; (fo. 101') story of the Emperor Theodosius II, BHG 1445v; (fo. 106') continuation of the anecdotes of Dionysios begun on fo. 68°; (fo. 108°) Life of Xenophon, his wife Maria and their children John and Arcadius, in Modern Greek,

BHG 1877 γ ; (fo. 135 r) note about sins; (fo. 135 v) see fo. 46 r above; (fo. 136 r) end of an account in Modern Greek about the last events in the life of Christ (see fos. 210 – 261 v), followed by extracts from Michael Glycas, entitled κεφάλαια νηπτικά ετι καὶ τοῦτο ἠπόρηται εἴτε φθαρτή ἐστιν ἡ ἁγία τοῦ χριστοῦ μετάληψις; (fo. 137') extract from Symcon of Thessalonica on the Liturgy, beg. ή θεία τάξις τῆς ἱερᾶς μυσταγωγίας; (fo. 138°) Chrysostom, extract from De Proditione Indae, I (P.G. Papadopoulou-Kerameus, 'Ανάλεκτα 'Ιεροσολυμιτικῆς Σταχυλογίας (St Petersburg, 1891), I, pp. 400-3; (fo. 150°) three more anecdotes in Modern Greek, the first wants a beginning, the second quotes Athanasius, the third begins ἔλεγέ μας ὁ ἀββᾶς ἄρ; (fo. 151^r) story, beginning wanting, about a devil shut in a καυκάλιον; (fo. 159^r) on silence and the monastic life, with the title τοῦ εὐαγγελίου λόγος, beg. ἠρωτήθη γέρων τί ἐστι τὸ ὑπὲρ ἀργοῦ ῥήματος; (fo. 173") Ephraem Syrus, Sermo Compunctorius, I (Assemani, I, pp. 28-40); (fo. 199°) Amphilochius*, stories of St Basil: BHG 258, and the story of St Basil and Joseph the Jewish doctor, incomplete, cf. Late 16th cent., in two hands, both of which appear in MS. 254. Decorated head-pieces and initials.

From one of the Sporades; bought in Calymnos in 1898. Presented 3 July 1940. Paper, 210×155 mm., 123 fos., numbered 1–125; 66 and 70 are wanting.

MS. 260. (Fo. 1^r) Theophilos Korydalleus, ἔκθεσις περὶ ἐπιστολικῶν τύπων, G G with interlinear paraphrase in Modern Greek; (fo. 73^r) model letters and replies, each in κοινή and ἑλληνική. At the end are addresses, some of them in verse, to various holy persons, beginning with St Stephen; (fo. 129^r) Gregory Nazianzen Tetrastichae Sententiae (= Poemata Moralia 33), with Modern Greek paraphrase; (fo. 140^r) with the title Εὐσταθίου ἀρχιεπισκόπου Θεσσαλονικῆς παρεκβολαὶ εἰς τὴν 'Ομήρου Ἰλίαδα, Homer, Iliad 1 and 11, with an interlinear paraphrase in Modern Greek, followed (fo. 209^r) by Iliad III–V. 403, without paraphrase, and (fo. 242^r) by ἐξηγήσεις in Modern Greek of Iliad III and IV; (fo. 283^r) Georgios Sougdoures, εἰς ἄπασαν τὴν Λογικὴν τοῦ 'Αριστοτέλους μέθοδον προδιοίκοισις,

with diagrams; (fo. 322^r) two troparia to be used as mnemonics: περιέχοντα τὰς συμβολικὰς φωνὰς ἑκαστοῦ συλλογισμοῦ.

Dated 1772 (fo. 321°).

Bought from Quaritch (note on pastedown of upper cover). Presented 3 July 1940. Paper, 203 × 145 mm., iii+322 fos. The binding incorporates the remains of a stamped leather cover.

MS. 262. Composite volume: A. (Fo. 1°) Nomocanon in Modern Greek, in 77 numbered chapters, beginning with an ἀκολουθία for penitents. Part of ch. 1 is wanting and there are several other lacunae. After fo. 21° the numbering of chapters stops, but the same subject-matter continues, including passages (fo. 28°) on incest and (fo. 34°) on homicide, (fo. 36°) a passage, ascribed to Balsamon, about the priesthood, beg. ἐπὶ παντὸς ἀναγνώστου, (fo. 42°) an extract from John of Citros on fasting, (fo. 44°) a cautionary tale about a priest tempted by the devil (cf. MS. 264, fo. 283°), (fo. 46°) another passage on the priesthood; (fo. 47°) ἀκολουθία promulgated by the Council of Constantinople in 1484 for those renouncing the Latin faith (G. A. Rhalli and M. Potli, Syntagma, v (Athens, 1855), pp. 143–6) with a lacuna between fos. 49 and 50; (fo. 54°) prayer for the forgiveness of sins, beg. Κύριε Ἰησοῦ Χριστὲ ὁ θεὸς ἡμῶν· ὑιὲ καὶ λόγε τοῦ ʒῶντος θεοῦ, incomplete, a longer version of Goar, pp. 536–7.

(Fo. 1^r) Damaskenos [the Studite], λόγος πεζη φράσει εἰς τὴν δεκάλογον τοῦ μωυσέως; (fo. 30^r) Theophanes, monk and rhetor, διδασκαλία προς χριστιανούς πεζη φράσει είς τὰ δώδεκα ἄρθρα τῆς πίστεως τῶν χριστιανικῶν πολλειτευμάτων; (fo. 49^r) διήγησις ώφέλειμος τοῦ ὁσίου πατρὸς ἡμῶν χωισμᾶ· τῆς πολιτείας τῶν ἁγίων μακάρων, (cf. BHG 1877y; (fo. 106^v) ὁπτασία πάνυ ώφέλιμος· δημητρίου, τοῦ ἰσβοριότου, in Modern Greek (the date given is 1580), beg. άδελφοὶ καὶ πατέρες ἐλᾶτε νὰ ἀκούσετε; (fo. 135 $^{\rm r}$) διήγησις πάνυ ώφέλιμος τοῦ αββᾶ μακαρίου τοῦ αἰγυπτίου, BHG 999r; (fo. 150°) with the title ... ἐφραὶμ τοῦ σύρου· λόγος εἰς τὴν δευτέραν παρουσίαν τοῦ Κυρίου ἡμῶν ...a work which corresponds fairly closely to Chrysostom*, De Salute Animae (P.G. Lx, 735-8); (fo. 164^{v}) with the title λόγος πάνυ ώφέλιμος εἰς πάντα ἄυθρωπου χριοτιανόυ, a work which begins in the same way as Chrysostom*, De Oratione (P.G. LXII, 737-40) but is a good deal longer; incomplete.

(Fo. 3^r) Miscellaneous items in various hands, mainly in Modern Greek: fragments of lists of prohibited offences and of penalties for the misdemeanours of women, prayers for the forgiveness of sins (as in Goar, pp. 536-7, 540) and pronouncements by spiritual fathers, including (fo. 12") an absolution pronounced by Laurentios, Archbishop of Sinai; (fo. 14^v) beginning of a work on repentance and punishment, very like a Nomocanon; (fo. 16^r) Nomocanon in Modern Greek, in 247 chapters (some lacunae); (fo. 268^r) continuation of the work on fos. 14^v-15^v; (fo. 283^v) story about a priest tempted by the devil, beg. πρεσβύτερος τὶς ἐν τώπω τινὶ διαγοντη ἔχον γυναῖκαν (cf. MS. 262 A, fo. 44°); (fo. 285°) διήγησις όφελειμος ἐκ τῆς βιβλου τῆς καλουμένης μέλισας: cautionary tales about priests, the 1st beg. ἐν ταῖς ἡμέραις τῆς βασιλείας τῶν ὀρθοδόξων; (fo. 297°) note on the moon's appearance in different months and its presages; (fo. 298r) table of the cycles of the sun; (fo. 299^r) miscellany [π]ερὶ τῆς ἀγίας κοινωνίας beg. 'Οοδὲν δὲ ούτῷ πρὸς τε ψυχῆς; (fo. 307°) model letters, e.g. to the Occumenical Patriarch, to the Metropolitan of Arta, εἰς ἀχάριστον, εἰς φίλον; (fo. 318^r) model γράμματα from spiritual fathers, all dated 1623; (fo. 328^r) a prayer, followed by an extract on blasphemy ascribed to Gregory Nazianzen; (fo. 3331) Leges Agrariae, somewhat abbreviated (Const. Harmenopuli Manuale Legum, ed. Heimbach, Leipzig, 1851, pp. 830-50); (fo. 348r) canonical miscellany, including selections from the Canons of the Apostles and of various Councils, interspersed with other material; (fo. 348°) a pronouncement by Ioasaph, Archbishop of Sinai, and (fo. 349^r) a set of questions and answers, beg. πόθεν γίνονται θανατικά.

Composite volume: 16th and 17th cents. The Nomocanon contains a reference (fo. 163^r) to a decision of Ioasaph τοῦ ἄχρι τοῦ νῦν...ἰθύνοντος τοὺς οἴακας, dated 1560, but the γράμματα on fos. 318^r sq. are all dated 1623. On fo. 6^r an obituary of Laurentios, Archbishop of Sinai, who died 1 November 1616. On

fo. 21° the note: εἶς τοὺς · αφφ(?)γ [1593?] νοεῦβριου ε̃ ἡμέρα τρίτη. ἐκοψεν ὁ μηχάλ βοήβόδας · τοὺς Τοὕρκους εἶς το Μπουκορεστου εἶς τὸν κερόν τοῦ Σολταν Μεχμὲτη · ἐπαρθ, οὶ Οὐγκροβλαχία ἀπὸ τοὺς Τούρκοὺς εἶς τοὺς ατοδ [1374] ἀπὸ Χριστοὐ γενησεος. Many other notes and scribblings, some with eighteenth-century dates.

Dawkins, Forty-five Stories from the Dodekanese (Cambridge, 1950), pp. 1–2.

MS. 298. Evangelion, Aland *l* 1984, beginning with the Gospel for Easter Monday. Lessons for each day of the week in the period of St John, the first week in Lent and Holy Week, otherwise for Saturdays and Sundays only. Ends with lesson for 6 March. Fos. 92^r–94^v are a later insertion, containing Matt. xxi. 44–xxiv. 2, which includes the Gospel for the Morning Office on the Holy and Great Tuesday, omitted by the main hand. A later hand has supplied a missing lesson on fo. 136^{r, v}. For lacunae see the list of fos. below.

11th cent., with 14th-cent. insert (fos. 92-4). Fos. 10-17 are written in a different hand and on different parchment from the rest of the book. Decorated headpieces (e.g. on fo. 113^v; but most of them have been cut out), titles in carmine and gold, polychrome initials, ecphonetic notation. On the recto of the first flyleaf is the note: W. H. D. Rouse 1906. Bought by me in Cos and bound by Mr Gray. When I came across this, the owner was selling it at the price of one 'franc' per leaf, to use as charms. Presented 12 June 1940.

(A semicolon indicates a lacuna.) Ruling type not in Lake.
